Grow in Love, Love by Serving

While on retreat in early June, the Council adopted a slogan that summarizes our mission. This is not a change to our mission statement, but rather a simple, easy to remember summary of it. Our mission statement is:

We are a dynamic Lutheran Church providing both innovative and traditional opportunities for all people to: experience God's Amazing Grace, to grow in Christian Faith, to participate in an extended family, and to serve our community.

Pretty good, right? I kind of like it. But we wanted something more memorable, some way to summarize it that stuck in the brain. Hence the new slogan, which is:

Grow in love, love by serving.

In case you were wondering, this is one of the lines to the cherished hymn "Go My Children, With My Blessing." It's short, pithy, and sums up rather nicely who we are as a church. My article for each of the next three months will be to break down part of this new slogan so that you can see how it summarizes who we are, and how following it even deeper will allow us to experience and grow God's Kingdom in even better ways.

First up is "Grow." All of us, every member of this church, should be growing. But growing how? In several ways.

1. Growing closer to God.
2. Growing as individuals..
3. Growing closer to each other.
4. Growing in our service.

First up is **growing closer to God**. This is where it all starts. Growing closer to God comes from reading your bible and praying, and doing both daily. Every day. To help you read your bible every day, here are some resources:

1. Go to this website each day for a different reading: <http://elca.org/Faith/DailyBible/>
2. Sign up for email devotions from Our Daily Bread.
3. Use the "Bible" app on your smartphone and read their daily verse
4. Here's a plan to read the entire bible in one year: <http://www.biblica.com/en-us/bible/reading-plans/>
5. If you would like an actual printed book with a daily devotion, talk to me. We'll get one.

If you need help praying, here is a simple guide:

1. Set a regular time and place.
2. Keep a list of people to pray for.
3. Pray using the Lord's Prayer as a model. Don't pray the Lord's Prayer; that's not what it's there for. Jesus didn't tell us to repeat the Lord's Prayer, he said "When you pray, pray *like* this." The parts of the Lord's Prayer are:
 - a. The Father's Character: praise God for who God is.
 - b. The Father's Kingdom: pray for it to come, and to be part of it coming.
 - c. The Father's Forgiveness: ask for it, and forgive others
 - d. The Father's Provision: thank God for providing, offer petitions for you or others
 - e. The Father's Guidance: pray for God to guide you or others
 - f. The Father's Protection: pray for God to protect you or others
4. Don't just speak, but listen. Make prayer a conversation with God rather than a list of demands.

If you pray every day, and read your bible every day, you will grow closer to God.

To **grow more as an individual**, find a mentor. Find someone who can show you how to be more the person God made you to be. Sit at their feet and learn from them. Learn how to be the person God called you to be. That's how we grow more as an individual.

To **grow closer to each other**, spend time together outside church. You're all smart people, you can figure this out. Go to dinner, go for walks, whatever. Just spend time with others from church, and do it outside the church walls. The closer you all grow to each other, the closer we grow to one another as a community.

Finally, God is calling all of us to **grow in our service**, and I'm not talking about volunteering at the CoOp (which is a fine thing to do!). I'm talking about serving your neighbors, the people around you every day. We don't have to look far for opportunities to serve. Invest in your neighbors. Pray for them. Serve them, whatever and however they need. Share the love of Christ with them, and share Christ with them. That is the final way God is calling us to grow.

So there you go. That's "Grow." There will be lots more on "Grow in Love, Love by Serving" in the months to come because talking about them is easy. Living them out is hard. Fortunately, we have the Holy Spirit, and we know that God loves us no matter what. So no matter how well you do any of these, remember: God loves you, and so do I.

Oh, My Goodness! I think I have a little preview of the "Dog Days of Summer!" It has been so hot out lately it brings back some old sayings my grandparents used to say; like, 'hot enough to fry an egg on the sidewalk' and 'it's so hot, I'm spittin' cotton'! Or maybe I heard these in old movies, but you get the general idea how hot it has been at my house anyway!

If our neighbors who need some help do not have money for air conditioning, I feel very sorry for them. My family is friends with a person who does not have working air conditioning and it is quite 'oven hot' in his house.

The heat is getting to all of us in one way or another! The Coop Food Bank is feeling the consequences of its generosity to help feed children as well as parents three meals a day! It is running low on many staples that usually get donated by all of us regularly! Bob said even in this heat, vegetable (especially) and other soups are requested and the supply is very low! Canned fruits of all kinds and apple sauce of various flavors are also needed items right now! Jelly of all kinds would be appreciated too since there are empty spaces for them on the Coop's shelves! Dried potatoes (instant mashed or any other kind of potatoes) are in very short supply also at this time! And, I continue to tell you that if you need something, chances are the Coop Food Bank needs the same items. Don't forget toothpaste and toothbrushes, soaps and shampoos too! They are always in short supply and in high demand!

Many things similar to our Grace Bags items would be wonderful items to contribute to help out our neighbors! I always think first of all the breakfasts and lunches that the children usually receive during the day while they are at school! Please bring in items for our neighbors who may need a little extra help feeding their families during these 'Dog Days of Summer!'

I will end with a quote from Paul's letter to the Galatians 5:13-14. It states "...13For you have been called to live in freedom, my brothers and sisters. But don't use your freedom to satisfy your sinful nature. Instead, use your freedom to serve one another in love. 14For the whole law can be summed up in this one command: "Love your neighbors as yourself! ..." To this I add, "AMEN!!"

As I write this note to you, 66 items have been delivered to the Lawrenceville Cooperative Ministry Food Bank! There is still a little more than a month of summer vacation for our children to be home and not fed with assistance of the schools! Please bring several items a week to help feed our neighbors! Also, monetary donations are also welcome at any time!

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BE PREPARED

When we think about being prepared for unexpected seasons of struggle, the story of Joseph and the famine in Egypt (Genesis 41) is a meaningful one to remember.

Joseph interprets two dreams for the Pharaoh in Egypt, predicting seven years of feast, followed by seven years of famine. Having been put in charge of the land of Egypt, Joseph stores up grain during the fruitful years, which he saved to use during the lean years.

Scripture says, “And since the famine had spread all over the land, Joseph opened all of the storehouses, and sold to the Egyptians, for the famine was severe in the land of Egypt. Moreover, all the world came to Joseph in Egypt to buy grain, because the famine became severe throughout the world.”

A number of spiritual principles are demonstrated in Joseph’s story related to how we use what we have been blessed with:

- **Protect against setbacks.** How would your family be financially prepared if an unexpected “famine” happened in your lives? Whether it’s a sudden job loss, a diagnosis or an accident, your financial situation can quickly become a crisis. Following Joseph’s wise example of preparation can make financial decisions easier when unplanned expenses do arise.
- **Spend less than you make.** We’d always like to have and do more, but when in your life might you be most likely to overspend? How can you follow Joseph’s model to spend only on what you need?
- **Have a short- and long-term strategy.** It may have been tempting in the fruitful years for the people of Egypt to eat more than they needed; but Joseph helped by planning for the future. What wise choices can we make to bridge the gap between seasons of feast and famine?

The good news is that when something unanticipated happens, you can be prepared! You can develop an approach to spending—rooted in your Christian principles—that makes the most of where you are now.

Combined Treasurer and Financial Administrator's Report for May 2016

May 2016 regular giving was \$17,943.00 which is \$6,486.17 under budget. Expenses were \$17,765.47, which was \$256.72 over budget.

May 2016 YTD Income was \$10,026.02 less than May 2015 YTD Income.
May 2016 YTD Expenses were \$17,685.34 more than May 2015 YTD Expenses.

2016 Year to Date Giving/Income is \$7,098.11 under budget.
2016 Year to Date Expenses are \$9,403.79 under budget.

Dedicated Accounts – We have a balance of \$34,251.92 in various accounts, which includes May 2016 receipts of \$1,467.00 and expenses of \$3,274.70. Balance of Old Capital Campaign Dedicated Account, which is included in above balance equals \$2,584.88.

May 2016 cash on hand is \$121,114.99.

There is also a table in the Youth Room that has collected a pile of posters and signs that should be stored somewhere else.

Worship & Music - June 2016

This month was filled with exciting events! Emma Ladd-Thomas had her Confirmation of Faith service, where she led the prayers and also spoke about what God is to her. We installed 8 new members into our congregation, and we had a Milestones services for our recent graduates and two members who are retiring! We offered Study Bibles to our new members, as well as our graduates.

We began our summer service time of 10AM, combining the first and second services. The sanctuary has been full! This will provide an opportunity for the Hospitality teams of both services to work together, and it will also allow for additional back up for our teams that have people out of town this summer. The choir will get a vacation over the summer, and we will have individuals sharing their musical talents each Sunday in place of the Choir.

Property - May 2016

A motion to accept the commission reports was made by Elaine Schwartz and seconded by Trish Ladd-Thomas, and the motion carried.

New Business

- Installation of the Council will be on Sunday June 19 2016 during the 10AM worship service.
- Request to share church: Pastor Scott has been contacted by Established Life Church to rent our building for their services. Points of discussion included:
 - How many worshippers?
 - When would they be using the facility? Any conflicts with current programs/groups?
 - How much to charge for rent? Suggested minimum of \$1500/month.
 - They would need their own insurance, liability coverage at least.
 - Pastor Scott will meet with their Pastor to find out more information and get some answers to our questions.
 - Discussion tabled, will continue discussions at future meetings.
- Pastor Scott has been asked to serve as a spiritual director for the Labor Day TEC weekend. He will be gone on Sunday September 4. Since it is a holiday weekend, we will have a Lay-led service with no communion.
- The annual congregational report was missing some commission reports. If a report was not submitted in time for printing, they should still be submitted and the document amended to include the reports, even if just for an electronic copy.
- Gwinnett Medical Center has developed a Faith Community Network (FC Network) that connects the hospital and faith communities in Gwinnett County. Through this program a human bridge is made between a hospital-based faith community nurse navigator and a faith community liaison. The goal is to build healthier communities and stronger relationships between Gwinnett Medical Center and local faith communities. A representative is coming to the church to talk with Pastor and sign us up for the Network.

Old Business

- HR committee has come up with Job Descriptions for the Office Administrator (Tracie Crowe), Music Director (Lois Simon), and Pianist/Organist (Charles Anschuetz) as well as an Organizational Chart and has requested that the council approve them. Tracie, Lois, and Charles have reviewed and signed off on their job descriptions. The job descriptions will be used for evaluation purposes.
- According to C.12.08 of the bylaws, "The congregational council shall be responsible for the employment and supervision of the salaried lay workers of this congregation." The council has delegated the supervision of the lay employees to Pastor Scott.
- Motion made by Elaine Schwartz to approve the job descriptions and organizational chart, as amended, seconded by Trish Ladd-Thomas, and the motion carried.
- Stewardship and the sending of quarterly giving statements: Pastor Scott would like to make giving statements available after each fiscal quarter, and have stewardship talks to correspond with 1st, 3rd, and 4th quarters (April, September, and January, respectively.)

- Bible Study on the Kingdom of God and what Jesus did within the Kingdom of God. He spent time with God (prayer), with the Church (disciples, preaching) and with Neighbor (healing sick).
- Kingdom of God exercise - ranking how we think AGLC does in each area:
 - o God - worship, bible study, prayer;
 - o Neighbor - serving, converting;
 - o Church - community, listen, respond

Pastor Scott asked the council to rank each of the areas under God, Neighbor and Church from 1-10, with 10 being the highest. Each person was asked to add their lines up and give him the "high" ranking, "middle" ranking, and "low" ranking. The exercise showed that AGLC is really good at God and Church, and there is room for improvement with our Neighbors:

- Vision: AGLC's Goals
- Mission: How we accomplish our Goals

- What is our Mission? (Evaluation - Where are we? Who are we? What is our current reality? Where is God calling us to go next?) A mission statement should be meaningful and memorable. Ours is meaningful, but not memorable:
 - o "We are a dynamic Lutheran Church providing both innovative and traditional opportunities for all people to: experience God's Amazing Grace, to grow in Christian Faith, to participate in an extended family, and to serve our community."
 - o Do we create a new mission statement? Do we modify our current statement? Do we keep our current mission statement and come up with a "slogan" that incorporates the meaningfulness of our mission while making it memorable?

SLOGAN: Grow in Love, Love by Serving!

- St. James Gift: \$22,000 - What do we do with it?

 - We took the visions from the earlier exercise and came up with an action plan for each. For each Vision we:
 - ✦ Identified the current reality
 - ✦ Came up with action steps needed to accomplish the vision
 - ✦ Identified which commission the vision falls under
