³¹ **He put before them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; ³² it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches" (Matthew 13:31-32).**

We have entered a lengthy period of time in the life of the church between Pentecost in May or June and Reformation Sunday at the end of October, known as Ordinary time. During this stretch of five month, sometimes longer, there are no festival days or seasons to celebrate in church. The liturgical color is green and will remain so during these months until Reformation Sunday when the color will change to red. The themes will change Sunday to Sunday, depending on the scriptures for the day. The lack of variety in liturgical color and seasonal emphases has led us to leave the Pentecost mobile and banners up longer than we might have otherwise, because over these months of what is called ordinary time, people usually get sick of seeing green and are eager for something special to celebrate in church.

However, there is a sound theological rationale for observing Ordinary Time for such a long stretch during the church year. When you think about it, we live most of our lives in "ordinary time," where time seems to pass day-by-day, hour-by-hour, with no obvious interruptions or revelations of God. We go through the same motions, caught up in the routines of life and the tedium of the same tasks, with few interruptions or breaks from the monotony. The challenge for us, as Christians, is to find God in the midst of the humdrum and the ordinary. Indeed, we are often so immersed in the routine and the repetition of our days that we are unable to recognize the simple blessings and revelations of God's presence in our midst. We require an experience that will shake us out of our doldrums.

This is why the New Testament entreats us often to "wake out of our slumber." **"Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers... (Romans 13:11)."** In the parable referenced above, Jesus compares the Kingdom of God to a mustard seed, which he says is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it is planted and germinates will eventually grow into a...shrub. A shrub... seriously! Is this supposed to impress us? How many of you are impressed by shrubs? In fact, I think that calling the mustard plant a shrub is being too generous.

Not far from the house where I grew up in San Diego, there was a hillside; and if we got any rainfall at all in the spring, the hillside would be covered with wild mustard. The yellow flowers the plant produced were lovely, the rest of the plant, however, looked like a glorified weed. Growing up in California I visited Sequoia National Park as well as Yosemite National Park, where I saw forests of giant redwood trees. Now redwoods are impressive. Shrubs and weeds not so much. So why does Jesus compare the Kingdom of God to something so ordinary, and so easily overlooked?

Could it be because Jesus is encouraging us to develop the kind of vision which can look at ordinary things and experiences, and see in those the extraordinary presence and blessings of God? This is our challenge during these weeks and months of ordinary time, to be able to recognize that God is with us, and reveals himself to us most often in the ordinariness of life. **"Behold, I am with you always,"** Jesus says. It is far easier for us to be focused on God's presence during a season like Advent and Christmas, that are centered on the coming of God in a unique revelatory way, in the flesh and blood of a particular child. However, without a special emphasis or event to celebrate we can so easily get swept away into the ordinariness of our routine, and become dull and obtuse to the ways God is present to us day-to-day.

Have a blessed **Ordinary Time!**

Many of us, I am sure, are already away for some R&R hoping for an escape of the local 'monsoons!' We have been very thankful that our property is at the bottom of a cul-de-sac and all the rain God has sent our way is running to the yard behind us! However, I feel sorry for those property owners as the folks there board/own about 15 or so horses! Needless to say, the rain has been terrible, but it has been a nice cleansing for the MacKinnons to enjoy some fresh air for a change! (HA!HA!)

But, with the rains came some inconveniences for the clients getting wet and getting their groceries to their vehicles! It was also tough on the 'workers' at the Coop getting groceries to the clients' rides. We always need the rain, but I am praying for moderation of rain when the Coop is open! The needs of the Coop are very similar every report! I want to remind everyone that canned corn and canned string beans are donated regularly and are "NOT" needed at this time!

Buy a few of each item and continue to bring them to the Coop or the church to help our neighbors who are going through tough times!

Also needed is Laundry Detergents/Bar soap/and Dish soap! The larger sizes (Sizes 5 and 6) of the Disposable Diapers are greatly needed. The last suggestion of needs is for all Feminine Products!

As of now, there is some painting going on and other work to hopefully be opening by June 23rd at 52 Gwinnett Drive, Lawrenceville, GA, across the street from the High School Football Field and next door to Lawrenceville Elementary! Secretary's Report: The April minutes were approved via email by consensus vote on April 19 2018.

Combined Treasurer and Financial Administrator's Report for March

April, 2018 Regular Giving was \$15,699.26, which is \$6,300.74 under budget. Expenses were \$16,544.58, which was \$1,443.70 under budget. April should have been a very healthy month, with Easter falling in April, and there also being five Sundays. We anticipated additional income of over \$6,000 that did not come to fruition.

April, 2018 YTD Income was \$16,825.07 more than April, 2017 YTD Income.

April, 2018 YTD Expenses were \$2,488.69 less than April, 2017 YTD Expenses.

2018 Year to Date Giving/Income is \$4,654.15 over budget.

2018 Year to Date Expenses are \$1,340.773 under budget.

Dedicated Accounts – We have a balance of \$37,538.21 in various accounts, which includes April, 2018 receipts of \$845.70 and expenses of \$481.20.

April, 2018 cash on hand is \$114,699.53 which includes \$37,538.21 in Dedicated funds; therefore, not in reserve/not liquid for general expenses.

I called a meeting of Homework Help leaders for Sunday April 22 following 11:00 a.m. service. The purpose of the meeting was to deal with comments that had been made to me identifying concerns about the way Homework Help is being run. These comments came principally from a single person, though there are multiple people who have made remarks to me. Mostly, the concerns had to do with a feeling that Homework Help can be too regimented and doesn't allow for the children who attend to be children, and doesn't permit them to unwind a little after a long day. I felt calling the meeting was necessary because as we know people in church tend to triangulate, that is, talk about their concerns to with people who can do nothing to address these concerns and often they don't speak to the very people who can.

So I felt calling the meeting would give people a chance to put their concerns on the table where they could be addressed by all the recognized leaders of Homework Help. I think the meeting was productive and some consensus reached concerning a few of the issues raised. However, it was expressed to me following the meeting by some of those in charge of Homework Help that they felt it was not appropriate for me to call this meeting; that I should have gone through those who are acknowledged to be in charge of Homework Help. The message was that as Interim Pastor I was exceeding my role as a short timer. I think it is fair to say that I am being perceived by some as trying to assert control or presence over ministries that are really not my concern. The concerns raised at this meeting have been forwarded on to the HOST Committee to address before Homework Help reconvenes in the fall.

Rudy Beilfuss and I (representing the HOST Committee) had what I thought was a very positive meeting with the principal of Bethesda Elementary School. It took awhile for me to schedule this meeting—a lot of telephone tag between myself and the school office. We went to the meeting to ask what, besides Homework Help, could we do as a congregation to help the children and families connected to Bethesda Elementary school. The principal had no particular critique of Homework Help. She thanked us for the good work we are doing, and affirmed that the Homework Help program is viewed very positively by teachers and staff at the school. She did invite me to become a member of their Teacher Council which meets periodically during the school year. I think this could provide useful contacts within the community, and will keep the ministry of Amazing Grace in the minds of school leaders. I am certainly willing to do this, however, it only makes sense if the Term Call is approved by the congregation, and it is confirmed that I will be staying longer. The principal also offered for us to have a table at Open House Day in August when children and parents come to meet their teachers. We can distribute information about Homework Help and anything else relevant. If we can produce a flyer about VBS and get it to the school before the end of the year, the principal said they would be happy to include it in paperwork being sent home with the students.

Following up on last month's discussion concerning Evangelism and Outreach strategies for AGLC, I have been formulating an idea of forming a small group to examine more closely the needs of the community and develop ideas of how we might begin reaching out more intentionally as a congregation to our neighbors. As has been pointed out to me, this is largely a commuter congregation now. Other than the families who have been connected to AGLC through Homework Help, most people drive a longer than average distance to come to church here. I have ordered some reading material on devising mission strategies in congregations. I will look it over and if it seems useful, I will pass it on for others to read as well. I am thinking we will need a dual approach. Again, if the Term Call is going to be approved by the congregation, AGLC will be developing ways we can work with other Lutheran congregations in our area on shared ministries. Because of the inherent proprietary feelings congregations have about their own ministries and programs, I don't think we can have the expectation that this is going to lead to much growth within our own congregation. We don't want to give other congregations the feeling we are trying to compete with them for new members. So we must separately develop strategies that will be pursued by AGLC alone, to develop meaningful outreach into our surrounding community, meet needs, and invite people in.

At the last Magi Conference Clergy gathering a discussion was begun about shared ministry in our Conference. Ben Moravitz of the Synod office was in attendance to help facilitate this discussion. This discussion rekindled the conversation between myself and Pastor Kim Stover of All Saints about getting a joint meeting together of our respective Congregation Councils. Thus the proposal that we meet jointly in June. A number of the pastors present commented that given the distance between congregations in the Magi Conference, in many cases it isn't feasible for congregations to work jointly. Also there were some concerns raised about fostering competition between congregations, and turf issues being created if people were to come from

another congregation to assist with a ministry that is already established in one congregation. So it was suggested the best way for this to work would be for congregations in the same community to develop something new together and work on that. We are probably more likely to be working with All Saints, and Trinity, because of their proximity to us.

I of course will be attending Synod Assembly the first weekend in June. Synod Assembly runs through Sunday, June 3. Originally, I was going to plan to stay for the session on Sunday morning, and find coverage for myself here. But, as I have already announced I will be gone this Sunday May 20 for my son's graduation from Merrimack College, and I am also serving on the staff for Affirm which will take me away from June 8 through 16. That means I will also not be here on June 10. This would mean I would be gone 3 out of 4 Sundays between May 20 and June 10. I felt that was too many in such close proximity, therefore I am no longer going to be staying through Sunday of Synod Assembly. I had Tracie cancel my Hotel reservation for Saturday evening into Sunday, and I will be driving back on June 2 to be here on June 3.

The HR Committee will be meeting at the end of this month. In preparation for that meeting I have prepared a Job Description for a Child Care Worker in case AGLC opts to hire someone to oversee the nursery, and HR has asked me to do staff reviews leading up to the HR Meeting. The church doesn't have staff evaluation forms however for the various staff positions. I understand that last year each staff member was given a Staff Self-Evaluation Form to complete and the pastor simply made notations in the margins of that form. Since we have nothing else at present that is what I will plan to do as well. The self-evaluation form will be distributed at this Wednesday's staff meeting. Then I will make my comments, meet and go over this with each staff member over the next several weeks. Over the next year I think some kind of evaluation tool should be developed to use with our staff here at AGLC.

•April 1 was Easter. Attendance was 69 at 9am and 93 at 11am for a total of 162. 2017 Attendance (3 services) was 189. I don't know which service the choir was counted in any of these numbers. They potentially could have been double counted or potentially not counted at all. Something for Hospitality/Ushers to consider every time the choir sings during more than one service.

•The Choir, and all music, was phenomenal on Easter.

•Church decorations, symbolism of butterflies, was a beautiful new touch to our sanctuary and our souls during the entire Easter Season.

•The Summer Schedule was decided and publicized.

•Hospitality – Bob and Joan Koehler have joined the ranks of Hospitality volunteers for the 8:30 service in particular and have been trained. They can be substitutes during the Summer Schedule.

•If you're interested in being an Acolyte, Reader, PowerPoint Operator or Worship Assistant, please let Debbie Teal know.

- We still need one or two Sound System Volunteers. Please let Debbie or Lois know if you're interested.
- W&M Committee had a meeting April 24th. We reviewed Wednesday Lenten services, Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter. The last Sunday of Easter is May 13th (also Mother's Day). Pentecost is May 20th and the Congregation will be encouraged to wear red, orange or yellow. The colorful dove/origami mobile will be hung and then after Pentecost, perhaps moved to the Cross. We spoke about Summer worship (i.e. which worship liturgy/style is best suited for the summer). We're going to talk about Midweek Grace during our next W&M meeting (Date TBD). Confirmation will be scheduled for Reformation Sunday in October. First Communion will be taught by Judie and Pastor likely in September and then a Sunday will be picked.

Property – Lee Bennett

- During the last month we changed all HVAC filters. Thanks to Bob MacKinnon for the assist on this project.
- We also accomplished a serious re-organization of the choir loft. The sound board was rewired, book shelf moved and reorganized, safety marker tape was installed for increased safety and a general cleaning was done.

New Business

- From HOST: Reconfiguring Wireless Network - At the most recent HOST meeting, it was mentioned that we've had several computers donated to the church to be used on Wednesday nights during Homework Help. Our current network will not support the need that we will have for connectability, and Rudy Beilfuss has a couple individuals that have volunteered to update/reconfigure our wireless network. HOST wanted to bring the matter to council to make sure the appropriate channels are followed for decision making. As property chair, Lee Bennett requests to be part of the conversation, but otherwise he says to "go for it."
- Church Accessibility - currently individuals in wheelchairs going up for communion have to go out the back/side door, through the narthex and back into the sanctuary. There needs to be adequate space for wheelchairs to move through the sanctuary. It was also brought up that we have removed chairs from the ends of rows to make space for wheelchairs, and worshipers sit at the ends of those rows meaning that those wheelchair spots then can't be used. Chairs with arms are the only ones with "reserved" markers, and even those are taken by able bodied individuals at times.
 - Council has decided to make accessibility a talking point at our May semi-annual meeting to bring awareness to & educate our congregation to the needs of some worshipers.
- AFFIRM Scholarships - we have money available in various dedicated accounts that can cover scholarships for our youth members who want to attend. Council has approved up to \$700 to cover scholarships for the 2 youths that want to go and need assistance.
- Meeting with All Saints- tentatively scheduled for 6/26; Members of leadership at both churches, both pastors and Connie Ferguson (AGLC Call Committee chair) will be invited to attend to begin discussions on possible shared ministry opportunities.
- Council Retreat for Term Calls Goals - Once our new members are voted in, Liz will find out availability of all council members, and a retreat will be scheduled for the month of June.
